The Delta Life Development Foundation, Inc. in collaboration with volunteers from the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. hosted an annual “Adopted Daughter Seminar and Luncheon” on March 15, 2014 to expose young ladies to positive members of the community that are giving back to the community in

various ways. Community members are invited along with program participants in the Dr. Betty Shabazz Delta Academy, and the Dr. Jean Noble Delta G.E.M.S. programs. Other young ladies from the tri-city area were invited to participate as well. The targeted groups of “at risk” youth and young ladies from a local elementary school also attended. The main goal of the seminar portion of the program is positive exposure for the young ladies in the areas of social skills, etiquette, self-esteem and networking with other girls and with role models from the community.

Special guests have included: Past presidents of the local chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., women in public service (Mayor, Mayor Pro-Tem, Assistant City Manager, Tax Commissioner, members of the school board) and local attorneys. Other role models and volunteers invited included retired and active duty members of the military, fire department and police leaders.

The 2014 event had 80 participants in and positive feedback that was received from participants and other guests was all positive. The young ladies loved the etiquette training, fellowship, music and door prizes.

# Dr. Betty Shabazz Delta Academy

*The Delta Academy was created to enrich the lives of young girls ages 11-14 as they navigate the world. The goal is to provide educational opportunities and life skills to combat the stigma of academic failure and low self-esteem all the while providing mentoring and insight into new career avenues. Volunteers assist girls who have shown potential; however need additional guidance, support and skills to achieve success.*

Catching the Dreams of Tomorrow, Preparing Young Women For the 21st Century The Delta Academy was created out of an urgent sense that bold action was needed to save our young



females (ages 11-14) from the perils of academic failure, low self-esteem, and crippled futures. Delta Academy provides an opportunity for local Delta chapters to enrich and enhance the education that our young teens receive in public schools across the nation. Specifically, we augment their scholarship in math, science, and technology,

their opportunities to provide service in the form of leadership through service learning, and their sisterhood, defined as the cultivation service learning, and their sisterhood, defined as the cultivation and maintenance of relationships. A primary goal of the program is to prepare young girls for full participation as leaders in the 21st Century.

Delta Academy has taken many forms. In some chapters, the Academies are after-school or Saturday programs; others are weekly or biweekly throughout the school year; and still other programs occur monthly. At a minimum, chapters plan and implement varied activities based upon the needs of the early adolescents in their areas. The activities implemented most often include computer training, self-esteem and etiquette workshops, field trips for science experiences and for college exposure, and special outings to cultural events, fancy dinners, museums, plays, and concerts.

The events this year have been very goal oriented and each attempt has been success. The student's grades have remained steady during the year. Throughout each meeting there have been insightful conversations which have not only benefited the students, but the facilitators as well. The project assigned was completed and exceeded expectations of the facilitators.



The Academy started the new year with twenty-eight students present. There were also 10 gracious committee members in attendance. Students were given a orientation folder featuring activities to help them grow academically, socially, physically and interpersonally to enhance their city, community and the world.

# Dr. Jeanne L. Noble Delta G.E.M.S.

*The purpose of DELTA G.E.M.S. (Growing and Empowering Myself Successfully) is to form a continuum of service and address the specific needs of young African-American women between the ages of 14 - 18 and/or in grades 9-12.*

The latest statistics reveal a steady decline in the enrollment of African-Americans in institutions of higher learning. DELTA G.E.M.S. program can be viewed as a road map for college and career planning and will instill in teens the need to excel academically. It will also assist teens in proper goal setting and planning for the future beyond high school and will create compassionate, caring and community minded young people by actively involving them in service learning and community service opportunities. On August 23, 2014, 22 young ladies were inducted into the program.

Throughout the year, teens in the Delta GEMS program participate in a variety of workshops designed to increase self-esteem, breakdown stereotypes and become an empowered youth. Speakers from the Columbus community are invited to conduct workshops on emergency preparedness, college preparation, career development and resume writing.

Teens involved in the program participate in at least three service projects every year throughout the Columbus, GA community. In 2014, Delta GEMS participated in the Chattahoochee Valley Help the Hooch, Domestic Violence Vigil, DBI Radiothon, and volunteering at nursing homes such as Cobis Personal Care.



# Economic Development

*Aims to provide education and financial planning, fiscal responsibility, investments and entrepreneurship which encouraging support of minority owned businesses and women business owners.*

National economic trends—unstable employment, the threat to Social Security, and the widening gap between wealth and poverty are the basis for the development of the signature program, **Financial Fortitude Seminar and Expo**.

## SEMINAR

On Saturday June 7th 2014 The Economic Development Committee of the Columbus (GA) Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. held a Financial Fortitude Seminar



from 9:00am – noon at the Delta Life Development Foundation House. The seminar was entitled “Planning Today for Tomorrow’s Events”. The moderator for the event was

Kimberly Perkins.

The panelists for the Financial Fortitude Seminar were Carl Brown (Independent Insurance Agent), Brandi Hett (Estate Planning Attorney, Synovus), Pat Hugley-Green (State Farm Insurance Agent) and Reggie Sparks (Primerica Financial Services).

The topics were discussed in detail and provided a wealth of information:

- ◆ Living Trust versus Will
- ◆ Buying Disability Insurance
- ◆ Determining How Much Life Insurance to Buy
- ◆ Investing Life Insurance Money
- ◆ Checking Beneficiary Information Yearly
- ◆ Buying Whole or Term Life Insurance

Guests enjoyed learning about the different types of insurance and determining how much insurance they will need to provide financial stability for their families. The panelists stated that the amount of life insurance to purchase depends on several factors and everyone should sit down with their families and have “The Talk”. Lack of preparation can lead to a lot of stress and leave families financially unstable. By having an action plan in place families will be relieved of unnecessary stress. People tend to equate Estate Planning with death but a properly drafted estate plan a trusted designee manage affairs by following specific written instructions.



The panelists provided literature to the community for them to take home to review.

The seminar empowered members of the community by educating them on making sure loved ones are protected and provided for after a death.



# Education Development/Assault on Illiteracy

Columbus GA Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. through the Delta Life Development Foundation, Inc. fulfilled a \$20,000 pledge to the Chattahoochee Valley Library System for the endowment of the Delta Study Room at the Mildred L. Terry Library. The Delta Study Room houses artifacts and memorabilia from the original library built in 1953 to support community African American citizens as a result of segregation. The Foundation presented the final endowment payment of \$3500 on May 2, 2014. Library Director Alan Harkness stated, "The endowment makes a difference for the system and allows it to be effective to do the things for the community with outreach into the community".



# E.M.B.O.D.I. (Empowering Males to Build Opportunities for Developing Independence)

EMBODI orientation was held on August 27, 2014, at the Delta Life Development Foundation House. There were 11 young males, five committee member and six parents present. EMBODI is designed to help African-American males reach their fullest potential educationally, socially and emotionally. The young males participation in the following community programs: Columbus Help-the-Hooch (Great American Clean up), Aids Walk, Kwanzaa and MLK parade. Their participation help them focus on culture, mental health, lifestyles and education in the community.



# International Awareness and Involvement

*Annual program to increase the awareness and involvement on international issues as well as philanthropic support for maternity hospital operated in Africa and a Kwanzaa Celebration in December to celebrate African heritage and legacies.*

In support of World Aids Day, which is recognized December 1st of each year, The International Awareness and Involvement Committee collaborated with The Chattahoochee Valley Better Way Foundation, located at 4411 Rosemont Drive, Columbus, GA, on Tuesday, December 2, 2014 from 2:00 – 5:00 p.m. We provided water and red ribbons for participants who were being tested for HIV. There is free HIV/AIDS testing conducted at this location throughout the year and is available to everyone. Along with free testing, the center provides condoms, educational brochures and information, case managers and counseling services.



The dual purpose for the committee's involvement was to educate and encourage testing for members of the community. In addition to testing, there were case managers available to explain basic facts and answer questions, such as the difference between HIV and AIDS, what causes the disease, prevention, and staying healthy.

from the walk, with additional donations that amounted to \$500.00. The Ryan White Foundation provides primary medical care for those afflicted with the disease and need assistance paying for services. Some of the services provided at the foundation include: HIV counseling and testing, antiviral medication, case management, support group, and educational information.

It was a three mile round trip walk from Rotary Park to Trade Center. After participants returned from the walk, there was a short program. Speaker of the program was Mrs. Shankeia Pollard, Founder of non-profit: EITA, Inc., Education is the

Answer. Her speech was informative and delivered a call to action that education and awareness should continue after the walk. Representation of the community included approximately 70 teenagers, young adults, adults, men and women. Brochures and education pamphlets were available to take home.



The event was open to the tri-city community. According to Centers for Disease Control, African-American and Latina women are a group disproportionately affected by this disease, so to have four African-American women stop by was a very positive outcome.

The International Awareness and Involvement Committee organized The 4th Annual HIV/AIDS Walk at The River Walk on Saturday, December 6, 2014. This walk was a continuation of the World Aids Day event on Tuesday, December 2, 2014 and was open for participation of everyone in the community. Local businesses supported this event and graciously made donations to provide refreshments to walk participants.



Not only was the purpose of the walk to provide education information and to encourage testing, but also accepted monetary donations were accepted. All money collected was donated to the Ryan White Foundation located in Columbus, GA at The West Central Health District. A total of \$301.00 was collected

*Provides workshops, activities, and information on current health issues and providing public access to information of local health agencies and medical personnel who aid in the continuous maintenance of good health and better living conditions. Programs include, but are not limited to: stress reduction, health fairs with emphasis on screening detection, symposiums on critical health issues, diet and nutrition, and HIV/AIDS Awareness.*

**“Come Exercise Your Mind – Play Bridge”** public event was successful for the Physical & Mental Health Committee. The eight-week Bridge Course held for the Columbus community at-large culminated in true bridge fashion --- Columbus, GA hosted a Duplicate Bridge Tournament (a very successful one to boot)! The DLDF House was filled to the brim with bridge players coming out to compete for Master Points. On Friday and Saturday Dec. 5 & 6, 2015, 130 players checked-in for tournament play. The tournament players came from near and far as our two-day event roster showed players hailing from states such as:

Georgia (Atlanta, Columbus, Decatur, Fayette, Jonesboro, Lithonia, Midland, Snellville and Stone Mountain), Alabama (Birmingham, Gadsden, and Wetumpka), Arizona (Peoria), and Texas (Austin). Duplicate Bridge



play, which differs from the standard rubber bridge, allows players to accumulate Master Points for a lifetime which makes the game both highly competitive and addictive, which is why players will travel in order to compete in a tournament.

With such a variety of players, our 14 class participants were able to compete against both new and seasoned players and see the benefits of our “Come Exercise Your Mind” event. The benefits related to the strategic card game of bridge are: (1) bridge players can keep the onset of Dementia & Alzheimer’s at bay, (2) bridge players stimulates the mind as each game is different based on the deal and the skill of your opponents, (3) bridge players once learned is a lifelong activity as we witnessed numerous players confessing they have been playing 40+ years and play to age 80 to 95 years old, (4) bridge is an international activity and one can find a game happening every day of the week on land or sea, and (5) bridge play keeps its participants socially active.



This event very successful as 100% of the “Come Exercise Your Mind – Play Bridge” class came out to compete in the Bridge Tournament, and a majority of the class participants became members of the of the American Bridge Association, which shows a strong commitment to keep learning and playing bridge – which ultimately will exercise the mind. In summary, our “Come Exercise Your Mind” class participants came away with (1) hopefully a shaper memory, (2) having learned a new card game, (3) that can be played internationally, and (4) became members of the American Bridge Association.



# Political Awareness & Involvement (Social Action)

*The purpose of the Social Action/Political Awareness and Involvement programs is to use our influence toward the enactment of laws for the protection of the unfortunate and weak and for the repeal of those depriving human beings of their privileges and rights.*

## **Social Justice and the African American Male**

Recognizing that African American males disproportionately represent correctional populations in comparison to other racial groups, several local organizations joined together to address this community concern. This program was held on April 26, 2014 at George Washington Carver High School. This event was an open forum for all concerned citizens to inform them of alarming statistics regarding this topic's impact on the youth in the Columbus, Georgia community, particularly African American males.

The goal of the program was to provide a forum in which local youth and their parents are provided with information and skills which will prevent youth from becoming a statistic as it relates to the criminal justice system. Local attorneys from the district attorney and public defender's office, private attorneys and law enforcement personnel provided expertise in specific areas on the topic. One of the panel members shared his testimony of being wrongly convicted and imprisoned. These presentations were very compelling and prompted four students to become registered voters at the end of the forum.

A total of 225 individuals attended this event. Audience members' responses were overwhelmingly positive. There were remarks such as "great event", "much needed information", "good to see organizations working together", and "very good speakers". After the event many of the presenters stayed around to continue speaking to audience members concerning specific situations.

During the Southern Regional Conference, Columbus Alumnae Chapter received the Regional Political Awareness and Involvement Award for this program.



# Senior Citizens Seminar/Luncheon

*Annual luncheon and forum for senior citizens in the community which focuses on health issues, diet and nutrition, and improving the lifestyle (body, mind and spirit) of senior citizens*



The Senior Citizens Seminar is held annually for senior residents of government subsidized housing in this community. The goal is to improve the lifestyle (body, mind, and spirit) of senior citizens. We recognize the high incidences of diabetes, hypertension, depression, and other illnesses among this segment of our population. Using a proactive approach, the committee plans a program with emphasis on encouraging participants to make healthier lifestyle choices. We provided information on healthy eating, medicating properly, and socialization. This was also demonstrated by the serving of a nutritious meal, thought provoking games, and the spiritual, enjoyable entertainment. Attendees were also reminded of the importance registering to vote and voting. Their voices must be heard on various issues which directly impact their well-being.

The Senior Citizens Seminar was held on April 8, 2014 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Delta Life Development Foundation House. The Physical and Mental Health Committee partnered with this committee in sponsoring this event. 63 guests and 25 Delta Sigma Theta Sorority volunteers were in attendance.

The health matters segment of the event was informative, reminding attendees of their individual role in maintaining a healthier lifestyle. 28 DVDs addressing the issue of memory loss were distributed to guests. The games were fun, engaging, and stimulating. Nontraditional and traditional prizes were awarded to winners of the games. A table was set up for nontraditional prizes which included fresh fruits, sweet potatoes, toilet tissue, and etc. Our guests stated they look forward to the next seminar in 2015.

# Senior Teens Seminar

*To provide high school senior girls who have excelled in academics with critical information that should help them with their transition into college and be useful throughout their collegiate matriculation.*

The Senior Teens Seminar was held May 5, 2014 at the Delta Life Development Foundation House. This is an annual event held each May for high school seniors who are in the upper 20 percent of their graduating class, and who plan to pursue higher education. This seminar is aimed at preparing high school seniors for college both academically and emotionally.



The Senior Teens Seminar was presented in the format of a forum. The information was presented on Basic Finance (how to budget and protecting your credit report), Social Media (what potential employers look for on social media page(s) and how to avoid the pitfalls of social media), and College 101 (balancing academics and social issues during the first year of college).

Also, this event serves as the venue for announcing competitive scholarship winners. There were approximately 150 individuals in attendance.



